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
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February also saw Sixth Form student Adam Kerrison's first novel published, while the month concluded with a virtual meeting between Mr Britton, Ms Grant and Graham Stuart, MP for Beverley and Holderness. Graham said, "In the face of coronavirus, it is great to see Longcroft seizing opportunities to go beyond the main curriculum to include archaeology and marine life – while keeping mainstream learning up to the mark."

Monday March 8th saw us welcome our pupils and Sixth Form students back to school after the Lockdown.

We continued to celebrate the varied paths taken by inspirational former students, featuring Laura Meredith who has enjoyed parts in 'Casualty' and Sky One's popular drama series 'Cobra' and Carys Marsh who combines her career as a Graduate Cost Consultant with playing in Super League for Wigan Warriors and internationally for Wales.





In a valuable enrichment opportunity led by Maths teacher Mr Ita, Year 10 pupils Macklan Brown and Bryony Young excelled in the UK Mathematical Trust's Challenge, earning Silver certificates.

Further enrichment, this time focusing on Year 8, saw First Story writer-in-residence Lee Harrison host the first of a series of creative writing workshops. In time these would result in our second published Anthology.



## Summer

The tragic loss of much loved and respected Year 11 pupil Riley Ketley gave the year's earlier challenges perspective, reminded us of the value of friends and family and allowed us to reflect on the way Riley lived his life – his sense of humour, his kindness and his consideration for others.



We were proud to reflect on the work of two former pupils - Rachel Thompson's work as a mental health nurse and Coldstream Guard Josh Drew's involvement in the funeral of HRH Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh.



Thirty pupils in Years 7 and 8 tested their mathematical skills in the UK Mathematics Trust's Junior Challenge. Mr Ita was delighted with their achievements, which included Gold certificates for Alfie Adams, Olivia Langdon, Eloise McNamara and Harry Walker.

2021 has seen one of the most exciting Formula 1 seasons in history and we are proud that former pupil Ben Towse has been part of it through his role with Williams Racing.

We were delighted to celebrate what we are sure will be the start of a fantastic career as current pupil Jack Charles made his debut for Hull FC's Under 16 team. Jack is one of three players from his year group to represent our city's teams, with Hayden Todd and Tom Rae signing for Hull Kingston Rovers.



June also saw the first cup success of former student Rachael Woosey's incredible first season playing in Super League for St Helens. 2021 saw Rachael and her teammates win all three trophies on offer and ended with her international appearance for England in France.





In June, Sixth Form student Tegan Blake-Barnard won First Story's 100-word story competition, her moving 'A Melody Lost' impressing the panel of judges from Vintage Books.

Our performing artists have been particularly affected by the challenges of Covid, but June saw A Level students finally able to perform their wonderful production of 'The Danny Crow Show'.

June also saw pupils and Sixth Form students consider the meaning of 'diversity'.





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In July we were able to benefit from collaborative work. Through the Food Teachers' Centre our Food and Nutrition teacher Ms George arranged for a delivery of free fish from Grimsby company Ish Fish which allowed pupils to develop their culinary skills, while Mr Coupe secured a partnership with local company Bostonair as part of our Careers Education programme. This was particularly pleasing as former student Liam Wilson joined the company in 2016 after completing his A Levels. In addition, our First Story cohort and some of our most talented Year 8 artists enjoyed a virtual workshop with award-winning illustrator Julie Monks.

In more literary success, Year 13 student Jacob Hill saw his poetry used as part of a resource put together by First Story and part of National Poetry Day.



## Autumn

**As we welcomed our new Year 7, we began the term with a celebration of our summer's results, reflecting with pride on the fantastic achievements of those pupils and Sixth Form students who overcame adversity to earn their grades in unprecedented circumstances. We shared in their delight as they progress to their chosen destinations.**





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We were proud to celebrate the tremendous achievement of Year 10 pupil Freya Vidal who, after featuring in the summer's prestigious English Schools' Athletics Association Championships, was crowned National Champion in the 200 metres.

In October Year 9 Rocco Pulling's success in the England Boxing National Schools' Championships saw him become our second National Champion of 2021.



Tegan Blake-Barnard enjoyed more success as she earned a place on the prestigious Rathbones Folio Mentoring Scheme – one of only six candidates nationally to be selected. Year 7 pupil Emilia d'Andilly demonstrated initiative and creativity in winning our Hopes and Dreams Competition.

Jevon Mills has featured regularly in Newsletters during the final months of 2021. The inspirational former pupil, still only 18 years old, signed his first professional contract with Hull City, made his international debut for the Republic of Ireland and then enjoyed what we are sure will be the first of many appearances in Hull City's First Team in their victory at Cardiff City.







## HAZARDOUS EARTH TEST 1

**Lithosphere:** the uppermost layer of the Earth. It's cool and brittle. It includes the very top of the mantle and the crust above.

**Convergent Boundary:** where two plates move towards each other.

- plates move towards each other, causing friction and pressure build-up.
- Deep ocean trenches
- Volcanoes
- Underwater mountain ranges

**Conservative Boundary:** where two plates slide past each other.

- plates create friction by travelling at different speeds and direction past each other.
- Earthquakes

**Divergent Boundary:** where two plates move apart.

- plates move apart due to convection currents.
- Ridges
- Undersea mountains/volcanoes
- Mid-Atlantic Ridge - North American and Pacific/North American

**Structure of the Earth**

Outer Core, Inner Core, Lithosphere, Asthenosphere, Mantle, Crust.

**Core:** Inner core is solid. Outer core is liquid. Made of iron and nickel. Dense. Becomes less dense further out.

**Mantle:** Upper and lower. Silica based rocks. Lower mantle is quite rigid. Part molten.

**Crust:** 0-100km thick. Solid. Silica based rocks. Continental / Oceanic. Divided into tectonic plates.


