# Headteacher's Welcome

#### Well Done Years 10 and 11!

I want to take this opportunity to congratulate our Year 10 and 11 pupils on their behaviour and focus in the classroom. There is a real determination from our pupils, who want to do well and surpass last year's results. This is not just demonstrated in class but through engagement in Period 6 lessons that have already started. Higher Tier Maths for example saw a fabulous turnout on Thursday night with Mrs Low, and History is proving a real draw with Mr Pearson every week. A fantastic attitude from all those getting involved, well done!

I have had the pleasure this week of observing pupils in Food and Design Technology lessons. Ms George's class were working on different foods including bread and soup and discovering how using a variation of ingredients or thickening agents would affect the outcome.

Nathaniel and Evie were both looking at how soup consistency changes with different agents. Nathaniel was using starch from pasta which made his tomato soup very thick. Evie was using a branded thickener that not only affected the viscosity but also the taste. It was great to see how well both pupils could explain their practical and what they were learning from each stage.

George was working on how differing ingredients affected bread making. The portion I tried was delicious but other variants, including some made with rice flour, were less successful. It was fantastic to see the pride the pupils had in offering me samples to demonstrate their progress. Whilst discussing the course with Rylee, it was great to see how his future plans, wanting to do an apprenticeship, gave him motivation to push for the highest grade he can achieve in Food Technology.

In Design Technology with Mr Dyson, Lewis was being shown how to use the metal grinding wheel. After demonstrating he could explain the steps involved, he was away shaping his metal to his final design. I was amazed at the speed of progress the pupils made from learning about the machine, its safety and use, to confidently being able to shape metal within one lesson.

### Samantha Wins Gold

Congratulations to Year 10 pupil Samantha who continues to make impressive progress in her karate.

Samantha explained, "I got into karate by training with a friend for fun and started really enjoying it so I carried on. I have been doing it for 5 years and got to a brown belt. I compete for region 31 and have my title champion of the north. The recent competition was regionals in Ecclesfield, Sheffield. I got 2 silver and 2 gold medals and am going to nationals.

## **GCSEPod proving** popular

GCSEPod login sessions have been taking place this week with pupils making sure they can access the materials. This can be done using their school email account details. Subject teachers have started to allocate specific Pods for pupils to complete. Alongside Period 6 sessions, GCSEPod allows our pupils to plan and revise utilising some of the most effective methods available.











### **Sixth Form Students Explore Options**

Last week our Sixth Form students visited the National Apprenticeship Show in Harrogate where they discovered more about Apprenticeships across the region.

The Yorkshire Event Centre provided an ideal venue and students were able to engage face-to-face with over thirty of the region's top Apprenticeship employers and providers including PwC, the University of Sheffield Advanced Manufacturing Research Centre and the armed forces.





Higher and degree level apprenticeships were of particular interest, and the University of Sheffield AMRC Training Centre offers a number of different pathways into engineering and the opportunity to draw on the experience of an elite Russell Group university and the resources of a world-leading research and innovation organisation, supported all the way by a team of specialists with a wealth of industry experience.

York St John University's apprentices get cutting-edge and relevant training during a work-based degree apprenticeship. These apprenticeships are underpinned by the rigorous subject knowledge of a degree qualification, testing academic learning and workplace capabilities. As well as the benefit of not having to pay course fees, York St John University offers industry-specific training and support throughout an apprentice's learning.







We had two aims. The first was to broaden students' understanding of apprenticeships, how they work and what they might look like after A Levels. The second was to test out a potential route that students might take after Year 13. Several students told me they found the event interesting. While many students are certain about heading to university to continue their studies they now understand the post-graduate apprenticeship pathway, allowing them to enter into the world of work after their university days - perhaps at a higher, more senior level.

All in all, the day was helpful, provocative and in many cases galvanising for our Sixth Formers based at Longcroft. We appreciated the efforts that Mr Coupe, our Careers lead, put in to creating the opportunity.

# Our Year 13 Sixth Form Ambassadors say...

This year, building on previous models of student leadership, members of our Sixth Form are taking on the role of Sixth Form Ambassador.

I interviewed Liv Farrah, Tom Kelly and Matthew Allenby - the Ambassadors from Year 13. We discussed the role, their reasons for putting themselves forward and their hopes for the year.

When asked why they wanted to become an Ambassador, the students spoke about representing Longcroft and providing a platform for the ever-growing number of students' opinions.

They were also keen to gain experience in organisation skills, noting that attending school events and opportunities outside school allows the chance to gain independence in leadership environments. Tom said, "We want to make the student voice heard and represent followers, being a big fish in the little Longcroft pond."

The role also involves liaison with members of staff and the Ambassadors see their role as a core component of the school's commitment to the promotion of democracy, empowering the student body through mutual respect and recognition of diversity.

We already partake in mentoring schemes to enrich the lives of every student under the Longcroft umbrella." 




At the start of this academic year I promised an insight into our Longcroft Learning Cycle, something that pupils experience in every classroom and in every lesson. A lesson framework that ensures that every minute of every lesson counts and that will provide you with a starting point for conversations with your child about their learning.

During the 'Teach' stage our pupils are inspired by the infectious passion the teacher has for their subject and their in-depth subject knowledge. It is the presentation of something new, for example new vocabulary, text, method, section of play, poem, piece of music, theory, idea or concept. The new information or skill is taught in such a way that promotes active engagement and discussion and will be presented in a way that ensures pupils are actively involved such as PowerPoint, video clips, whiteboard, ICT and demonstrations. You could ask your child questions about how they learned about new information.

# IN FOCUS HISTORY

Having featured work from Year 7 pupils in History last week, we turn our attention to Year 11 and demonstrate the tremendous progress made in their analytical writing.

The theme 'Society and Culture' offers pupils an insight into people's lives in England between 1066 and the early 20th Century. Initially pupils focus on life in England pre-1066 before studying life in Medieval England – the period from 1066 to 1500.

Mr Pearson said, "Pupils studying GCSE History develop a broad, balanced and detailed understanding of the recent histories of three main modern-day World Powers: Germany, Russia and the USA. Year 11 pupils demonstrate their understanding of aspects of continuity and change in the USA by exploring Political, Economic and Social decisions and developments and critiquing interpretations about selected aspects between 1920 and 1973."

He added, "Both in class discussions and through work in their exercise books Year 11 pupils demonstrate maturity in their ability to explain but particularly to evaluate. I am delighted with their progress as historians and their work offers our Lower School pupils a standard to aspire towards."


