

On our playing fields, the children enjoyed events including teambuilding activities, football, cricket and rounders as well as an opportunity to find out who could hit a ball the hardest with a cricket bat as monitored in a speed challenge. In some cases, the chldren's teachers also got involved in that particular challenge and didn't necessarily come out on top! The children had an immense amount of fun participating in the activities; from one of our local primary schools, Isaac said, "I had a lot of fun doing the different events and games, I'd say my favourite was the cricket. The trick was not to hit the stand!"

On hand throughout the event were our Sports and STEM Leaders. These Lower School pupils helped to coordinate the event, working with the different groups of children and acting as ambassadors. Our Sports and STEM Leaders have an important role in the school, assisting in events after school to promote healthy living and an ethos of participation in sporting



activities. Sophie said "It's been good to be involved today, working with different children and also leading on some of the organisation." Evie added "The children from primaries were amazing today and very creative. I saw some fantastic work in the Science lessons building a marble run."



STEM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics and represents subjects and careers in this area. As part of the STEM area for the day, children enjoyed competitions in Science, designing rollercoasters that could allow a marble to run for the longest time. Isla from a local primary said, "I thought the challenge was going to be really tricky getting the marble not falling over, but after several attempts we built a good model. The Science team ran a live leader-board so the children could see how they had got on during the day. Head of Science Mrs Scott said "All of the children were so engaged today; two primary schools are going to run the activity again and let us know if they have

improved! They enjoyed it that much. It's good that the schools are going to keep in touch." As part of our transition team, we are keen to promote these effective, long-lasting partnerships with primaries, and would love to continue with further outreach events in the future.

As part of the Mathematics challenge, pupils were flexing their maths muscles, working with geometry and angles. Jacob said "To begin with, I wasn't sure how well I'd get on. I worked well with my friends and that maths challenge was great. I liked cutting the straws." The children were very enthusiastic in these sessions, some keen enough to push themselves into the realms of Pythagoras' Theorem as part of our "stretch" part of the session, which is especially impressive for Year 5 children! Mrs Powell was particularly impressed with the children's approach to their challenges and said that their effort levels were impeccable, with a desire to learn new skills.





For the first time, we offered Art sessions under the STEM umbrella. Art is an important, creative skill in so many STEM careers, from Product Design to Architecture. I am really pleased to share some of the beautiful mask work that the children produced. Some primary schools are going to use what they made to explore the subject and the links to STEM further. Mrs Holmes said, "It was a fantastic day, I got a lot out of it and so did the children." Jess, a Sixth Form helper who was really keen to support us on the day said "I was so impressed with the children and how imaginative they were! There really were some fantastic masks made that they can be very proud of."







The day was a great success and we look forward to welcoming the children back into school in September for our Longcroft School Open Evening. Please keep an eye on future Newsletters for updates relating to both this event and other opportunities.


Mr Worthington writes:

It gave me great pleasure to welcome Professor Lorch to present to our Lower School children about "The Science of Superheroes". Professor Lorch, who joined the University of Hull in 2006, has done a great deal to promote the love and curiosity of Science not just on a local scale but nationally and internationally too.

He is the founder of Hull Science Festival which takes place annually, and he has written many articles for The Guardian national newspaper about Biochemistry amongst other topics. You may have also heard him appear on BBC local radio as well as discussing how people perceive chemicals on BBC Radio 4.

Our Year 7 and Year 8 children were wowed by his demonstrations on topics including bullet momentum and how superhero flight works! In a hands-on demonstration, he showed the children how technology can help with the self-assembly of materials; this included not only magnetic means but how the smart alloy Nitinol works and has medical

applications such as artery widening and dentistry. He also demonstrated how magic tricks could be performed using magnets.

Throughout the presentation, our children were captivated. Professor Lorch did a full question and answer session at the end which lasted for a good ten minutes, allowing the children to explore their sense of intrigue and curiosity of Sciences. It was a fantastic presentation and we look forward to welcoming Professor Lorch into Longcroft again in the future.

Mr Henderson writes:

Pupils in Year 10 have been watching those in Year 11 going through the mocks and exam season this year. It is now the right time, at the end of Year 10, to introduce them to not only the type and style of questions but to the exam venue. The exam hall can be challenging for some; this is why we start with shorter exams in Year 10 whilst they get used to the new experience. As we see annually with our Year 11 pupils, they develop and become learners who can demonstrate their subject craft, ready for the next stages in their education.

Lessons are already taking place going over the learning that will be assessed in the mocks. I have been able to see how in a Chemistry lesson, pupils were being taken through each topic and its key points. Pupils are then also given ways in which to revise and materials/ websites to do so.

In a slight change to previously published data, the Year 10 mock exam week begins **straight before work experience**. ## **Attendance Matters!**

Hello again. I was always brought up with books around me. My parents understood the value of books and I was encouraged to read for my own pleasure from an early age. I still remember the joy I found as a youngster in the "Busy Town" books of Richard Scarry, Herge's Adventures Of Tintin and the Ladybird books of the time (the 70's I hate to admit!). This progressed onto authors such as Sir Arthur Conan Doyle and Charles Dickens. I would spend many an hour on our weekly visit sitting in the Library in Beverley engrossed in a book while my parents chose which Mills and Boon, or Sven Hassel novel they would be taking home that week. It never bored me. The books gave me a whole world of incredible stories and information to discover.

Reading regularly and exploring books both at home and school can be so important when a child is developing their reading, but how can parents and carers support their child in reading? Reading shouldn't be a chore. Daily family life can be extremely busy or complex and time to sit and read can be forgotten or difficult to manage.

Take a look below at some different ideas and tips for promoting reading; there may be an idea for you...

### More than just books:

Reading doesn't just have to be about books. Words are everywhere! Encourage your child to read whilst out and about; this can be less daunting than sitting down with a book and also address the issue of finding time. Possibly look at a magazine together, read information leaflets about places or information boards on daytrips. You could set your child a 'reading whilst out and about' or 'reading around the home' homework task such as 'record 5 places you spotted the letter "e".

### Online:

E-books can provide a different way for parents and carers to engage with reading; some people may feel more comfortable with a digital device than a physical book. Many e-books are available for free, some school reading schemes also have e-books available online.

#### Authors:

Author websites can also be available on-line, and parents and children may enjoy exploring their favourite authors.

#### Libraries:

Both the school and local libraries are an invaluable resource. Promote the library and encourage your child to discover this free resource. Going to the library can be a fun way to spend a few hours on the weekend and dedicate some time to reading. Most libraries have a wide variety of books to explore and a cosy environment. Libraries usually have free internet access to explore e-books or author websites too. They may have audio books that can be borrowed or listened to also.

I hope maybe you too can create that same fascination in reading that my parents instilled in me.

# Memory Lane

This week in our trip down Memory Lane takes us back to 2000 as we feature our successful senior football team, managed by Mr Eldridge.

The team is pictured with Sir Trevor Brooking who made over 600 appearances for West Ham United scoring 103 times during a 17-year spell at Upton Park. Twice an FA Cup winner with the Hammers in 1975 and 1980, he earned 47 England caps, scoring five times for his country. Since retiring from the game Brooking has enjoyed a successful career as a BBC pundit, as caretaker manager of West Ham and as the FA's Director of Football Development. He was knighted for his services to sport in 2004.

## Last half term pupils took part in an intra-school athletics competition. This involved completing 100m, a vortex throw and 4x100m relays.

Pupils compete in teams named after inspirational competitors from the 2012 London Olympics. ### Congratulations to former pupil Adam Fox who became the Under 20 Northern Champion in the 400 metres!

Adam, who runs for Kingston upon Hull Athletics Club, won in an impressive 49.57 at Manchester's Sport City – a time which would have seen him take fourth place in the Senior event and close to the personal best time of 49.08 he achieved in York the previous week.

Adam, who has represented Humberside in the English Schools Championships, is now ranked 13th in the UK in 400 metres.

This compelling narrative focuses on Philomena's search for him, a true story of love and loss, hypocrisy, and secrecy, made into a major feature film starring Judi Dench and Steve Coogan.
