Mr Henderson writes:

Most Year 11 pupils have now completed all their exams and we will see them for a last assembly very soon. Good luck to those pupils with a few exams left, including Food, Design Technology, Statistics and Further Maths. A massive well-done to Year 11 - they have put in so much hard work. Pupils' focus and effort has been fantastic, both in the morning briefings before exams in the Theatre and in the exams themselves.

GCSEPod still remains available for our Year 11 pupils and provides excellent transition units and work designed specifically for those moving from GCSE to A Levels.

Year 10 Mock Exams are coming up fast; these exams' main purpose will be to identify gaps in knowledge well in advance so pupils, parents and staff can plan to address these.

With this in mind every lesson and every week matters, all the way up to the exams next May and June. Revision guides have sold well. They can be ordered in school using ParentPay, and GCSEPod remains a fantastic resource. GCSEPod, for those still unfamiliar, provides short videos on different topics. It is a great revision resource with tangible outcomes – it improves GCSE grades. I recommend it unconditionally and feedback from pupils is incredibly positive. Videos can be downloaded to save on data use and the short 5-minute video format is especially useful for pupils who find themselves sitting down at a desk to revise arduous work. It can be used anywhere, and one pupil told me they would get through 5 videos just travelling to school on the bus.

Longcroft School usage remains good but we always strive to improve. Later this term we will be reflecting with our Year 10 pupils on their usage of GCSEPod and other strategies they are utilising to ensure effective learning and revision. It will



be vital for pupils to use it over the Summer Term to address weaker areas in subjects, so we hit the ground running in September. The more we do now the easier it will be later. Thank you to all parents and carers for your support in this. Pupils are also being asked to access SENECA - Mrs Scott has been working hard to ensure all pupils can access this resource for GCSE learning.

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Mr Coupe writes:

This week we look ahead to our Year 10 pupils undertaking their work experience. Work experience is an immensely valuable experience that will help pupils to further understand the world of work, develop important life skills and open their eyes to the range of employment opportunities available to them. We are very pleased to be able to reintroduce it as part of our Personal Development offer within school.

Our Year 10 pupils are out on work experience during the week beginning 3rd July, with most pupils undertaking a five day-long placement. A small number of pupils are on the Paris trip at the start of that week, and so will do two days of work experience on their return. A bespoke document is created for each pupil and these are currently being distributed. This document sets out the full details of the placement, including the location, hours of work, main contact, job description, dress code and lunch arrangements. In addition, it includes a full Risk Assessment for the placement outlining any potential risks and the control measures that will be taken. As I'm sure you will appreciate, given the complexity of the task, it is important that we get this information out correctly!

Pupils have also been issued with a work experience logbook which prepares them for their placement, and they have been working through this with form tutors. It particularly highlights some vital instructions for pupils undertaking work experience, including the importance of the kinds of employability skills and attributes that employers look for in their employees, including:

- >> Personal presentation
- >> Enthusiasm and initiative
- » Communication and literacy
- >> Time management and organisation
- » Numeracy



In addition, the logbook highlights skills that help pupils shine in their role job, such as:

- >> Integrity (honesty)
- » Problem solving and creativity
- >> Teamwork
- » Negotiation and decision making
- » IT

These are the attributes that will lead to a successful work experience placement.

Work experience can be such a rewarding experience for pupils, and we really hope that they get a lot out of their placements. To step outside the confines of school and experience the work place first hand is a major stage in a young person's growth into an adult. The situation can be daunting, but with positivity and a can-do attitude, pupils will be able to overcome their concerns and see how their own skills, attributes and abilities can be of great value in society. It is a privilege to be able to provide these experiences for our young people. I am sure it will be a time of immense personal growth for our Year 10 pupils, and I wish them every success.

Hello again. This week I will be exploring reading once more. Within school we are really starting to accelerate our plans to improve reading. The Accelerated Reading programme is now firmly established, with children choosing books to read based on their reading ages. They are then tested on these to check for comprehension etc.

As our children get older, with lots of other activities competing for their time, how can you encourage them to make time for reading? It is so important that children keep reading, and see it as a valuable activity.

Some of the reasons are outlined below:

- Reading for pleasure has many non-literacy benefits and can increase empathy, improve relationships with others, reduce the symptoms of depression and improve wellbeing throughout life (The Reading Agency 2015).
- Reading for pleasure has social benefits as well and can make people feel more connected to the wider community. Reading increases a person's understanding of their own identity, improves empathy and gives them an insight into the world view of others (The Reading Agency 2015).
- Pupils with more positive attitudes towards reading are more likely to read at or above the expected level for their age (Clark 2014).
- There is a strong association between the amount of reading for pleasure pupils say they do and their reading achievement (Twist 2007).
- >> Pupils who read for pleasure make significantly more progress in vocabulary, spelling and maths than children who read very little (Sullivan and Brown 2013).



Here are some ideas to help engage your child with reading:

- Read yourself! It doesn't matter what it is pick up a newspaper or magazine, take a look at a cookery book, read a computer manual, enjoy some poetry or dive into a romance or detective novel. And get your children to join in if you're cooking, could they read the recipe? If you're watching TV, can they read out the listings?
- Give books as presents. And encourage your children and their friends to swap books with each other it'll give them a chance to read new stories, and get them all talking about what they're reading.
- Visit the local library together. It's always fun choosing new books to read, and keep an eye out for special author events at the library or local bookshops – children love meeting their favourite authors. Jacqueline Wilson and Anthony Horowitz always have signing queues that are miles long!
- >> Encourage children to carry a book at all times. That way, they'll never be bored (this is something you can do, too!)
- Keep reading together. Just because your children are older, it doesn't mean you have to stop sharing stories perhaps you could try the Harry Potter series or A Series of Unfortunate Events.

Don't panic if your child reads the same book over and over again. Let's be honest - we've all done it!

Any reading your child can do at home is going to be of benefit. Encourage them to be ambitious in their reading, to read texts that will challenge them.

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Jack earns England call-up!

We were proud to hear that former pupil Jack Charles, who this time last year was completing his GCSE's, preparing for the Prom and playing for Hull FC's Under 16 Scholarship team, has been selected in a 21-strong England Academy squad to face the French 'Espoirs' (Under 19s) in Saint-Gaudens on Saturday 8th July.

Jack, who has represented Yorkshire in the first two games of this year's threematch Academy Origin series against Lancashire, impressed England coach Paul Anderson and to earn a place in his first season at this level.

Jack, who has already made the step up to Reserve-grade with Hull FC, will be joined by Hull FC teammate Cobie Wainhouse and another former Beverley Braves player Louix Gorman who plays for Hull KR. Some of the players selected, from clubs including St Helens, Wigan Warriors, Leeds Rhinos, Warrington Wolves



and Wakefield Trinity, already have Super League experience. Jack Sinfield has made several appearances for Leeds Rhinos since making his debut last April while Warrington Wolves' coach Daryl Powell has praised promising forward Lucas Green following his impressive introduction into the first team.

Head Coach, Paul Anderson, said: "Travelling to the south of France to take on a slightly older French side in their own backyard will provide a stern test. All of the players making the trip have the potential to become elite performers on the domestic and international stage."

Jack said, "It's a dream come true. I was in total shock." He added, "It's just the start for me. I want to get better each training session and each game and I feel like I'm doing that."

Mr Baker said, "Jack thoroughly deserves this recognition. While very talented, he's always had an outstanding attitude – eating the right food, listening to advice, training hard and taking every opportunity to practise and work on aspects of his game. This is a fantastic opportunity to test his skills at a high level and another step towards a career as a Super League player. I'm sure Jack will relish the challenge and make the most of every aspect of the opportunity."



Scott Taylor relives his years at Longcroft



It was a pleasure to welcome former pupils Scott Taylor and Lewis Scott who returned to Longcroft on Tuesday and recalled memories of their schooldays.

Lewis, who left the Sixth Form in 2016 and is now Hull FC's Media Manager, arranged the visit as part of a feature into Scott's longstanding relationship with Rugby League's historic Challenge Cup competition – a trophy he has lifted three times at Wembley during his years as a player with Wigan Warriors and Hull FC.

Scott recalled making the difficult decision to leave Longcroft during Year 12 to focus on his rugby career having been offered the opportunity to train with his first professional club Hull KR. Now in his testimonial year, Scott moved to Wigan Warriors where he first lifted the Challenge Cup in 2013. Ironically, as a life-long Hull FC supporter who cheered his team to victory over Leeds at Cardiff in 2005, the black and whites were Wigan's opposition on that day. Scott said, "When Hull played Warrington in the semi-final I actually hoped Warrington would win so that my family would be supporting me at Wembley in the final!" He added, "When we won, I was thinking to myself how good it would be to experience the feeling as a Hull FC player." Following a year at Salford, Scott was to find out when after joining Hull FC he was a key player in the club's 2016 win over Warrington - the first time Hull FC had lifted the cup at Wembley. They retained the trophy the following year against Scott's former club Wigan.

Scott enjoyed recalling happy memories of his years at Longcroft, which included a performance in the school production of the musical 'Carmen' in which he demonstrated the skills that earned him a Grade A in GCSE Drama. He spoke particularly warmly of his special and ongoing relationship with Mr Cassidy, himself a former



Hull FC player, highlighting the support provided both as a coach and a mentor.

Mr Baker said, "It is always a pleasure to catch up with former students and both Scott and Lewis continue to excel in their careers with Hull FC. They are outstanding role models and it makes me proud that they speak so warmly of their years at Longcroft."

Now in his 15th year as a professional player, Scott has won every domestic honour in the game and represented his country. We look forward to featuring a more extensive interview with Scott in a future Newsletter.


Books about refugees, fiction and non-fiction, help us comprehend the refugee experience through the eyes of individuals, and develop our compassion and empathy. They deepen our understanding far more than a news item in the media, or a distressing image that briefly shocks us, but is just one of many images self-preservation has taught us to become accustomed to. Books stay with us, they teach us 'why' and 'how', and most importantly they allow us to grow. Below are some favourites. Please encourage your children to read them. There is a large display in the library.





Year 7 - Boy 87 by Ele Fountain

This is the story of two boys: Shif and his buddy Bini. Life changes abruptly when they are wrenched from their families by the military 'giffa' and sent to a remote desert prison, where they are helped to escape by their adult cellmates. So begins a terrifying journey to freedom.

The book fully illuminates the perilous nature of being a refugee, but ultimately, it is a story about the strength of the human spirit. Superb and edifying.

Year 8 - In the Sea there are Crocodiles by Fabia Geda

Enaiatollah Akbari's journey begins when his mother leaves him at a refugee camp in Pakistan, afraid that if he stays with her in Afghanistan he will die. She has no idea if she will ever see him again.

In his bid for a future free of war and persecution, Enaiatollah hides under lorries, travels in inflatable dinghies, and walks across mountains, where he meets all sorts of people: bad and good. This young boy's tory is the story of thousands of people who, in desperation, take a similar journey every day. It makes you question why borders exist, and the unfairness of being born in a certain country at a certain time. Engaging and accessible. A must read.

Year 9 - Hidden by Miriam Halahmy

Samir is from Iraq, seeking refuge in England, and being bullied at school. Alex defends him and their friendship begins. Slowly, she begins to learn more about his world, so different from her own. When the new friends find a drowning man in the sea choices must be made. What is safe and what is right?



This is an important book that tackles some complex topics, but balanced against its seriousness is great warmth and optimism.

Year 10 - The Crossing by Manjeet Mann


Sammy has fled Eritrea, to avoid being conscripted into an endless war. His dad is already dead for refusing to fight. Natalie's Mum has died, her brother has joined a far-right gang in Dover, and her world is disintegrating.



Written in intertwining verse, this is the story of two teenagers facing immense challenges. Their lives are very different, but they connect. Demanding and significant. Superb.
