

Our Year 9 pupils completed their Scholars Programme and enjoyed a Graduation Ceremony at the University of Sheffield.

Former student Laura Bradford, who left Longcroft in 2013 having earned A Levels in English, Geography and Music to study at the Royal Academy of Music returned to the area to perform with the Hull Philharmonic Orchestra. An accomplished professional musician playing with leading organisations including the London Philharmonic Orchestra and the Royal Opera House, Laura performed Séjourné's Concerto for Marimba and Orchestra in the beautiful setting of Hull's City Hall.

Laura said returning to play felt special. "The Hull Phil was a big part of my formative musical education. Many of the pieces I now play as a professional, I performed first with them."



FEBRUARY

We were delighted to be able to offer over 100 of our pupils the opportunity to participate in the **UK Mathematics Trust Intermediate Challenge**. The Intermediate Mathematical Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple-choice Challenge for pupils in Years 9, 10 and 11.

Year 11 pupil Angus, who earned a Gold certificate and the title 'Best in School', achieved a phenomenal total of 103. As one of the very highest performing pupils nationally Angus earned the opportunity to test himself in the Maclaurin Mathematical Olympiad - a follow-on round to the Intermediate Mathematical Challenge. Angus said, "I'm really pleased to have qualified for the Olympiad. Last year I qualified for the Pink Kangaroo, but this will be a very different challenge and I'm looking forward to it."

Angus said, "It was quite hard – there were points where I was banging my head against the desk!"

He added, "The questions were interesting and challenging – more than in normal lessons, which I enjoyed."

In April Angus took on the two-hour challenge consisting of six problems which required full written solutions, achieving a score which saw him awarded a Merit.

Harrison Adams and Tyler Parsons, both in Year 11, also earned prestigious Gold certificates.

Maths teacher Mrs Powell, who organised the opportunity, said: "The most rewarding aspect of the UKMT, in my opinion, is hearing the pupils that are less confident mathematicians say how surprised they are at how well they've done."

We held the first of two half-day sessions for a group of female and non-binary pupils who might wish to pursue a career in science, technology, engineering or maths subjects. Working with an organisation called **Women into Manufacturing and Engineering**, we were able to introduce 24 Year 10 pupils to a number of female employees working in these sectors. Alongside Carren, Cade, Tracey and Rachael from Howden's Kitchens and Lorraine from Centrica Storage, the pupils reflected on their own values, skills and personalities, and explored careers in which they might be interested in the future. The response of the pupils was really fantastic and they approached the sessions with enthusiasm and maturity.





MARCH

Year 9 pupils Amy, Anna, Emily and Katie joined over 100 young people from across the region when they put on their walking boots and tackled the Humberside Police Night Challenge.

A total of 111 young people walked nearly 13 miles around the Brantingham Dales whilst tackling a number of thought-provoking challenges along the way.

Year 11 pupil Ash Wells earned second place in an art competition - young people aged 25 and under were invited to produce an image illustrating at least one condition that comes under the neurodiversity banner.

As part of National Careers Week, we took over 130 Year 9 pupils to Hull University. This event was designed to give pupils an experience of what universities have to offer in a range of disciplines. Prior to the trip, the pupils were asked to choose what subjects they might be interested in from amongst a wide range of options. These covered such diverse areas of university education as the sciences, engineering, game-design, music, policing, healthcare, politics, education, midwifery, social work, art and music.

Four Longcroft pupils who are members of Beverley's Base Dance Company were among the BDC Royals team which competed in the United Dance Organisation British Dance Festival at Blackpool's Winter Gardens.

Ava, Ella, Hailey and Poppy, along with their teammates, won first place in their Under 16 Team Street Dance. They are now the British Street Dance Champions and have qualified for the World Championships which are in August.





MARCH



We collected donations towards an appeal that will help those affected by the devastating earthquakes in Turkey and Syria. Donations contributed to the wider appeal launched by Beverley businessman Ali Tekce – the East Yorkshire to East Turkey Emergency Earthquake Appeal.

Author and playwright **Saviour Pirotta** came to talk to Year 7 in the Theatre, an apt venue for such a gifted storyteller with excellent performance skills! He was due to collect the Fiction Express Award for his book Pandora's Box at a ceremony in London later in the day, but was in no rush to leave.

"I wish I didn't have to go. This is a wonderful school. I'd love to come again. So many of your pupils have the ability to be writers."

Saviour has written over a hundred books but is best known for the bestselling The Orchard Book of First Greek Myths and his Ancient Greek Mysteries Series for Bloomsbury. Like the gods and goddesses that populate his fiction he is a larger-than-life character: full of mischief, funny, and very wise. Our pupils in Year 7 clearly thought he was very entertaining.

Isla Addinall said, "He told really good stories off the top of his head. When he spoke about his granny on the exploding toilet it really made me laugh."

Year 11 spent a day working on revision strategies in Hull University's impressive Staff House. Pupils participated in short seminars on revision techniques that have proven to be some of the most effective strategies. These included effective mind mapping skills and flash card making.

Pupils were also able to discuss the revision they had been working on in order to get advice and guidance on how to improve. Pupils really enjoyed the day. Charlie said, "It was key for us to know how to revise well."

Several of our Year 12 students accompanied by Mr Coupe and Miss Taylor spent a week in New York City!

Whilst in the city they visited the Empire State Building, the Statue of Liberty, the Museum of Modern Art and Ground Zero - the former site of the World Trade Centre.

Competing against the country's best, Millie had a great race. She improved by over 50 places from last year and managed to be the 3rd girl home from Humberside.


Millie said, "I did a lot better than last year. The course was a lot harder and really hilly. I'm pleased to have competed in the English Schools' Championships again."

Over Easter over thirty pupils and Sixth Form students spent a week skiing in the stunning setting of the Italian Alps from their base in Santa Caterina.

Mr Martin said, "Skiers progressed exceptionally well. On the final full day of skiing we held a downhill slalom competition. I was delighted with everyone's attitude and behaviour throughout the week – they were fantastic!"

Year 10 pupil Libby was one of the few skiers with previous experience and during the week she felt she'd improved. She said, "We were all having fun as friends – even on the bus!" Having already skied in France, she added: "The snow was really nice – I'd recommend Santa Caterina."

The fact that I didn't have a full-time Academy contract in the first place and now I've been called up to Yorkshire. The stereotypes WE create?


The bodies of water WE pollute?


