SCHOOL*Mr Henderson writes:*

We are now at the end of the third week of term; time seems to move so quickly for pupils and teachers with the focus being on using every minute effectively. For Year 11, Mock Exams at the start of December are close – only 7 weeks away. Subject teachers are creating revision plans that will be shared with home to allow pupils a clear outline of learning to achieve outstanding outcomes.

Please discuss these with your child to help create a personalised revision plan starting before half term. Encourage them to access GCSE Pod and regularly review prior learning from Year 10, completing the check and complete tasks to assess their understanding. It is essential this review of early work starts as a routine now. Discuss homework and support your child to complete tasks, as subjects will also be helping them structure their learning and revision through the work they set. Supported, independent revision and homework is available every evening in the Library with Ms Carvill until 4.15pm. Teachers have also started Period 6 classes, which are extremely popular with pupils, and are one of the most impactful revision strategies.

A full list of Period 6 sessions will be available soon, and regularly published. A look ahead to some additional future content includes:

- » **GCSE Art** available now every Tuesday from 3.10pm – all Year 11 pupils studying Art are welcome. Pupils studying GCSE Art can also see Mrs Holmes to work on some lunchtimes.
- » **GCSE Music** – pupils now have 1 to 1 sessions with Mrs Harris during lunchtimes.
- » **Additional Maths and English** Period 6 sessions will start after October half term.
- » **Food GCSE** will soon have Wednesday Period 6 sessions to catch up on NEA1 & 2 Coursework.
- » **Product Design GCSE** Period 6 sessions will begin after half term with a focus on pupils' practical work.

There is lots more to come so please look out in our Newsletter for details.

We are also undertaking a GCSE Mindset programme this year through tutor time alongside our targeted intervention programme so I look forward to sharing further details in the coming weeks.

In the library you will find a large display of books, including great works of literature by black women writers, non-fiction books about black history, and autobiographies and biographies featuring great talents.

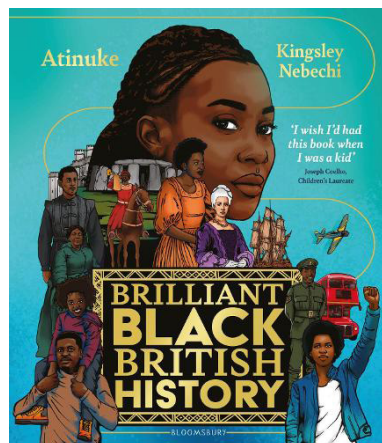

Brilliant Black British History by Atinuke, illustrated by Kingsley Nebechi

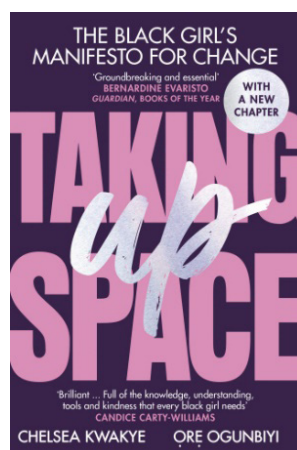
Reading Age 11+

Black And British, a short, essential history by David Olusoga AR BL 8.2 Colour Gold – Reading Age 12+

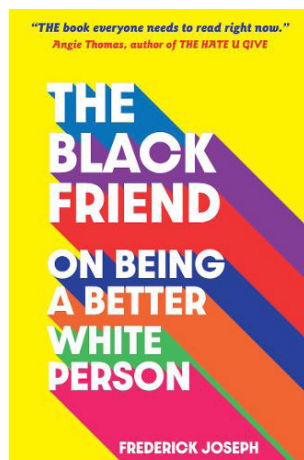

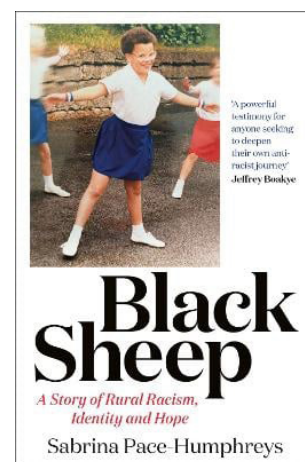

Gritty, triumphant, and hard to put down.

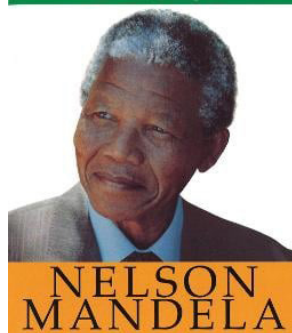


Long Walk to Freedom by Nelson Mandela
