Orlaith's Work Published!

Congratulations to Year 10 pupil Orlaith who has seen her work from the First Story Summer Residential published in a stunning Anthology – 'Emerging Adults'.

The residential at Lumb Bank saw sixteen students from First Story programmes all over England come together to write for a week. The students' work has been collated and published as 'Emerging Adults' – a celebration of their hard work, talent and creativity. Three of Orlaith's poems are included in the Anthology, copies of which are available in our Library – 'Blossoms', 'Secret' and 'Rivers' Run'.

England's leading creative writing charity for young people, First Story has been changing lives through writing for fifteen years, providing platforms for young writers to be read and heard. Orlaith is now one of our First Story's Ambassadors, which means that this year she can attend workshops again and help to support younger pupils.

Ali Johnson, First Story Programme and Partnerships Manager (Yorkshire), explained: "The Summer Residential is an opportunity for students who have shown great potential during the First Story Young Writers Programme to develop their confidence, creativity and writing skills in idyllic setting in West Yorkshire. This year, we selected sixteen keen young writers to attend the five-day trip to Arvon's Lumb Bank."

Ali added, "We were joined by experienced First Story Writers-in-Residence Cecilia Knapp, John Berkavitch and, as our guest on Wednesday, Testament."

Writer-in-Residence Cecilia Knapp described the first day of the residential: "Here's the scene: an old barn set on the lip of a valley in West Yorkshire, twinkling with fairy lights and lamps. The longest, squishiest, deepest red sofa I've ever seen and several other sofas and chairs configured in a horseshoe shape. Sixteen young writers huddled on the furniture, facing myself and co-tutor John, and looking incredibly nervous."

Cecelia explained: "Flash-forward to Friday and there wasn't a shred of trepidation in the air. In fact, there was the total opposite: genuine sadness that our time together was coming to an end and residual pride from Thursday night's inspiring showcase."

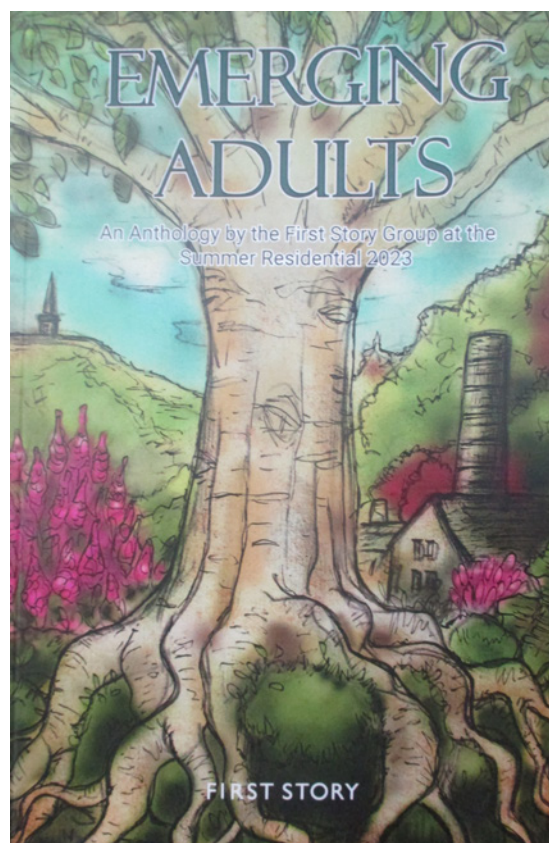
Orlaith said, "I'm really excited to have my work in the Anthology."

This week has seen the first Form-time intervention sessions taking place on Friday. These twice weekly sessions in either Maths, English or Science will allow a focus for the Mocks but in the long term, the extra learning needed by pupils to meet or exceed their targets. Based on Mock outcomes from Year 10, they will be re-visited after the Year 11 December Mocks as well as starting Phase Two of Form intervention starting in the new year. More subjects will be added to the intervention Form-time for two extra sessions a week. This will leave time for fortnightly assemblies and GCSE mindset sessions.

I have enjoyed the opportunity to see many lessons this week, observing learning, being amazed at the depth of work and discussing with teachers how the pupils are progressing. Here are some of the highlights.





Outstanding work by Heidi and Imogen who constantly push themselves and each other to work at least at target grade in Mrs Low's Maths class.

In Mr Deer's class pupils were reading Stave 3 of A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens and discussing the ideas about the change in empathy shown by Scrooge and the reasons behind these. Mr Deer and I were extremely impressed with contributions by Isobel, Sam, Katy and Elise.

In my next visit I chatted to Ella who was working on an Art project whilst we discussed her future plans and how Art would fit into these. Alesha had created an amazing picture where she had shown mastery in the art of perspective drawing in pylon wires. Travis was completing a detailed study of metal work in the Eiffel Tower.

In Food, I was able to try a lovely piece of pancake made by Effie and watch Lily making sausage and mash. Macie was completing a thin crust salami pizza which looked delicious. Ms George was really impressed with Lizzie who had made amazing quality pasta which she was turning into tagliatelle. The pupils could discuss their recipes, and this project was to increase fibre levels in meals.

Model making was occurring in Design Technology using double sided corrugated cardboard on a brief of storage ideas. Pupils were developing ideas such a fishing box by Jayden, also game storage boxes and garden lights. Mr Dyson was impressed with Laura's design and detail on a sewing box.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT



Mr Coupe writes:

Welcome to another Personal Development Update. In this update I would like to share details of the recent work that we have been doing to prepare our pupils for their next steps beyond their time at Longcroft.

Typically, although our Careers programme runs throughout the year, the autumn term is a key moment in my role as Curriculum Leader for Personal Development, in which my main focus is on careers. This year has been no different in that regard as we work to support our pupils in making the all-important choices about their future options.

In recent weeks, we have initiated a number of careers projects for Year 11 pupils as well as those in other years. Firstly, this year we are moving away from remotely delivered individual advice and guidance for all Year 11 pupils, and are instead working with a local company, GP Careers Consultants, who will provide individual careers appointments for all our Year 11 pupils and any Sixth Form students who need that support. Our advisor from GP Careers Consultants is a fully-trained independent advisor who meets with the pupil, discusses their plans and gives them tailored advice about their next steps.

We have also recently launched our plans for Year 10 Work Experience, with all Year 10 pupils now avidly seeking a placement with local businesses and industry. The pupils in Year 10 will be out on Work Experience from 1st to 5th July. Some pupils have already returned details of their placement to school, but we are always open to any further offers of placements. Please do get in touch if you feel you could offer a placement for one of our pupils. In addition to Year 10, for the first time this year, we will be organising Year 12 Work Experience, with more details to follow soon!

This term has also seen two trips out of school related to Careers. As highlighted in a previous edition of our Newsletter we took a number of Year 11 pupils to Howdens last half term. In addition, last week a number of pupils from Year 10, Year 12 and Year 13 went to visit Bishop Burton College for the East Riding Apprenticeship Fair. This included a range of exhibitors from local education colleges and apprenticeship providers, as well as local, regional and national employers of apprentices. The event allowed our pupils to have very informative conversations with the organisations involved in delivering apprenticeships meaning they can make their future decisions with a far better understanding of the options available to them.

Finally, we are very busy putting the final plans in place for our Careers Fair which will take place this coming Thursday on 7th December 2023. The first stage of the fair will take place during Period 5 of the school day where we will show our Year 9 and 10 pupils around a selection of the stalls and provide the opportunity for initial discussions with our exhibitors. The second and main stage will take place after school as normal and is available to all pupils in Years 9 to 13 and their parents/carers.

The evening will be centred around a range of stalls and representatives from local education providers including apprenticeship organisations who will be ready to speak with parents/carers and pupils about their future options. We will have representatives from East Riding College, Bishop Burton College, Armed Forces, Hull University, HETA, East Yorkshire Sixth Form, HBTC and many more. In addition, a range of employers will be present including Swift Leisure, NHS, Siemens Mobility Group, Ebtech Energy, Beverley Racecourse and East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

The main event will take place from 4.15pm to 7.00pm. If you are the parent of a pupil in Years 9 – 13, and wish to book a place, please do so via the QR code below and choose your expected arrival time. Whichever time you choose to arrive, you are welcome to stay at the event for as long as you wish, but the event will close at 7:00pm to allow exhibitors to travel home.

Primary Schools' Sports Hall Athletics

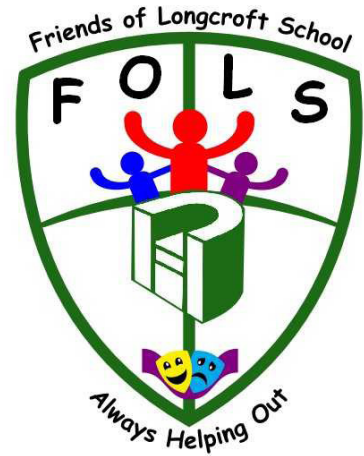
We were once again delighted to welcome many of our future pupils to Longcroft when we hosted a Sports Hall Athletics competition last week.

This month marks the beginning of another journey with First Story for Longcroft. Over the next few terms pupils and students from across year groups will be working with our inspiring writer in residence, Vicky Foster, to create our fourth anthology.



Vicky is a writer, performer, and poet and has led numerous workshops. She's a fabulous role model for our children. Her first audio drama, *Bathwater*, won the Imision Award at the 2020 BBC Audio Drama Awards. She has performed regularly on radio, and at events, and has been praised for her poetry collections. Her first novel is due out shortly.

To work with a professional writer and get work in print when you are still at school is a special opportunity, combining deep, social, and emotional learning with raised self-esteem. Students are encouraged to find their own voices, write the stories they want to tell, and experiment with language. It's amazing to watch them grow in confidence as their writing skills develop and they feel free to articulate their ideas and give each other feedback.

Throughout the programme the whole school benefits. Termly competitions and events, including the Young Writers Festival, all boost the profile and value of creative writing.



Students who complete the First Story programme can apply for exceptional development opportunities. Last summer Orlaith Brown won a fully funded place on the Arvon residential course. A new anthology, **Emerging Adults**, which features her writing was showcased this week with a virtual launch on Thursday. Orlaith is one of our First Story Ambassadors, which means that this year she can attend workshops again and help to support younger pupils.

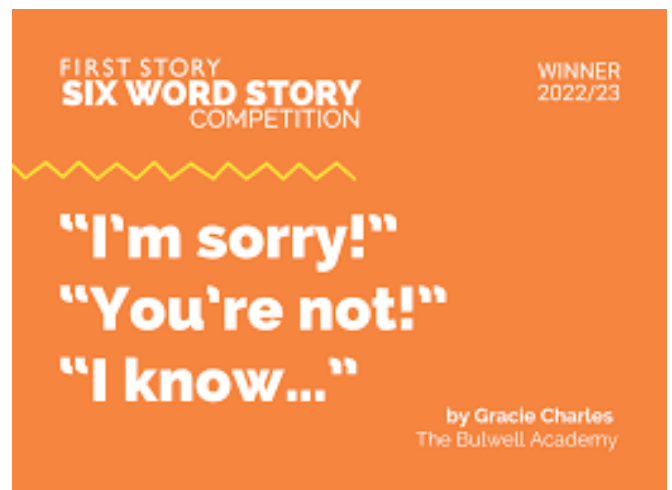
