Not many people have ever run a marathon, but when you listen to people who have they talk about the hours and hours of training and preparation they put in to getting ready for the big day.


In many ways the summer GCSE examinations are something of a marathon that pupils need to prepare for. In the same way a marathon runner cannot just wake up and run a marathon successfully, pupils cannot just arrive at their examinations with minimal preparation. Pupils have been preparing for 11 years for these examinations, building up knowledge and skills along the way. It is now time to focus on the big day, ensuring the final part of their preparation, the last 6 months builds and consolidates the effort over such a long time. Mocks can be seen as the time checks, are we still improving and practising what is required to be at our best on the big day.

The Ebbinghaus Forgetting Curve is a way of helping pupils to see that some revision each day is far better than cramming the night before.

This image best shows the forgetting curve: There is an especially useful article from Mind Tools, for those who have not heard of the forgetting curve.

Their publishing deals are likely to improve as are salesboosting opportunities, like book tours, increased publicity, and a raised profile amongst foreign publishers.

As Christmas approaches and the holiday beckons it's the perfect time to buy or borrow a good book. Below are a selection of prize-winning novels from 2023.




#### Waterstones Book of the Year 2023

#### Impossible Creatures by Katherine Rundell – Reading Age 11+

#### **Awaiting AR**

This fabulous fantasy tells the tale of a brave boy and a hunted girl and is set in a magical land called the Archipelago; populated by all manner of mythical beasts. It's an epic adventure that's been described as 'as close to perfect as fiction gets' and a 'masterclass in page turning storytelling'. It is destined to become a classic. Poignant and profound.



#### **UKLA Book Award 2023**

#### The Crossing by Manjeet Mann – Reading Age 12-17

AR - 3.6 - Green

This powerful verse novel has two narrators. Natalie's world is falling apart. Her mum has just died, and her brother is full of rage and hate. Sammy has fled from Eritrea in search of a new life, but the future might not be as welcoming as he'd hoped. A twist of fate brings them together and allows them some hope, but is it enough to repair a damaged world?


An emotional read. Truly life-affirming.

#### Loki, A Bad Guide to Being Good by Louie Stowell – Reading Age 9+

AR - BL 4.9 - Blue

This amusing diary style story will delight fans of Diary of a Wimpy Kid, and Tom Gates with its comic strip doodles and wit. God Loki is furious to be trapped in the body of a very weedy eleven-year-old boy, but that's what happens after one trick too many. Banished to live on Earth he is forbidden from using his magical powers. Will he survive and will he ever learn to tell good from evil? Great fun.


#### The Blue Book of Nebo by Manon Stefan Ross — Reading Age 13+/YA

AR - BL 5.4 - Red



This emotional novel explores the human capacity to cope in the aftermath of a global disaster. Dylan was 6 when The End came in 2018 and now he is 14 and must face adult responsibilities. He and his mother, Rowena, live on an isolated hilltop in Wales. They have survived in a post-apocalyptic world, but they have secrets which they jot down, in turn, in the Blue Book of Nebo.

Be aware the book contains descriptions of death, including that of a young child, and some implied sexual content. A sensitive and thoughtful slim read.



#### British Book Awards Children's Fiction Book of the Year 2023

#### Tyger by S F Said – Reading Age 9-12

AR-BL 5.0 - Red

This spectacular book tells the story of a world on the verge of destruction and a magical animal that just might be able to rescue it. Adam finds a mysterious, mythical tyger on a rubbish dump in London, and it's in grave danger. Can Adam and his friend Zadie rescue it and use their powers before the world is destroyed?

The myths and legends of history are cleverly woven into this superb tale. Envisage a world where slavery was never abolished. Highly imaginative and thought provoking. Excellent.


#### **Newberry & Coretta Scott King Award 2023**


#### Freewater by Amina Lugman-Dawson-Reading Age 10+

AR - 4.6 - Blue

This page-turning tale begins with the harrowing flight of two enslaved children from a plantation, who have unwillingly left their dear mother behind. Homer and Ada are eventually welcomed into a safe community with its own system of beliefs and traditions, and a complex relationship with the swamp. Will they ever be reunited with their mother?

An inspiring story of survival, courage, friendship and hope.

#### All My Rage by Sabaa Tahir – Reading Age YA

This tender tale of young love, deep regret, and forgiveness is breathtaking. It takes you on a journey from Pakistan to the USA as a newly married couple hope for a fresh start after a tragedy. Their child, Salahudin, becomes best friends with Noor, both outcasts in their small Californian town, but The Fight threatens to destroy their relationship and suddenly everything is spiralling out of control. Impossible to put down.
