St Mary's Technology Visit

At Longcroft we are keen to support schools across the local community to benefit from our resources and technical spaces. It is always a joy to welcome pupils in to our laboratories, sports facilities and workshops for extended projects or one-off experiences, which are not necessarily possible to undertake in their own settings. This also forms part of our extended transition, with KS2 pupils having the opportunity to familiarise themselves with a secondary school environment.

Before the summer break, children from St Mary's C of E Primary School visited our Design Technology department to build a model version of Baghdad as part of their studies in Technology and Religious Education. The pupils enjoyed getting to grips using our tools to make shapes to contribute towards a large model of the city. All involved had a great time and produced an impressive end product to take back to St Mary's. We are very much looking forward to the next project.

Transition Visits to Primary Schools

In the summer term, one of the aspects of the Head of Lower School role that Mr Worthington enjoys the most is preparing for our new, prospective pupils and parents visiting the school. These visits are vital as part of the transition process to ensure that our new starters get an outstanding start, where we offer excellent care in order for our children to thrive in September.

On both visits Mr Worthington was joined by Miss Fox, our Care and Achievement Coordinator for Year 7 and transition. Mrs Barry, Head of Year 7, also joined Mr Worthington on the visit. She said "It has been really lovely to get to know the children and they all seem very keen to get started!". As part of our visits, we answer all the questions that our new starters have for us on the day and provide the reassurances and support needed ahead of this big next step.

Thinking closer to home, our children have been wonderful ambassadors for the school, and have been of great assistance in aiding with school tours during the day, communicating and articulating well with regards to what makes Longcroft School so special. We know and care for every child as an individual. We actively encourage our children to demonstrate readiness for the future by developing the skills and qualities that will lead to success in life beyond school.



Celebrating Rewards



Recognising the tremendous amount of effort our pupils display week in and week out; we value acts of Great Heart, Great Thought and Great Vision. In the case of Great Heart, we are keen to celebrate kindness and peers supporting one another. In terms of Great Thought, we retain our commitment to academic excellence and success, celebrating progress and efforts in scholastic endeavours. Finally, Great Vision commends preparedness in children – making sure we set our young people up for success beyond school life post-Longcroft.

Charlotte earned over a fantastic 2,200 rewards last year – an average of well over two rewards per lesson! Charlotte, who joined Longcroft from Cherry Burton Primary School, said: "I've particularly enjoyed Science – it's a bit more complex than other lessons. We didn't do a lot of science in primary school so I'm enjoying it now." She added, "I put quite a lot of effort into lessons. I also play the violin and rounders. In Year 8, I'm looking forward to the increased difficulty in lessons."

Neve accumulated over 2,100 ClassChart rewards – another exceptional total. She said, "I've enjoyed Science and History a lot. I get on with my work and try hard." Neve added, "Some of my History projects have been quite good. I've put a lot of time into them."

Aidan received the most ClassCharts rewards of any Year 8 pupil. He said, "I do what I can in lessons to help out and if something needs to be done I'll do it. In History I think I'm doing well, and RE which is my highest grade so far."

It was a delight to distribute certificates to pupils that have accumulated more than a thousand points on ClassCharts. Amongst the gamut of accolades described by teachers giving feedback to children include attendance to extra-curricular clubs, outstanding pieces of classwork and supporting one another in our community

Outstanding Homework

In July, we congratulated Isaac and Lydia on the thought and effort they put into a recent piece of homework. Their History teacher Mr Cassidy said, "The theme is protest and revolt and Isaac and Lydia have done a great job here!"

Isaac, who joined Longcroft from Beverley's St Nicholas Primary School, earned over a fantastic 1,700 ClassChart rewards last year while Lydia, who joined Longcroft from Molescroft Primary School, has earned wonderful 1,680! Both pupils, who are in Miss Thomas' tutor group, have also been involved in a range of extra-curricular activities – congratulations to Isaac and Lydia on the great start they have made to their years at Longcroft!

Induction Events

It now seems so long ago, but back in July, we were delighted to welcome Year 6 pupils and their families to our Induction Evening. This is an opportunity to gather important information ahead of our Induction Day and of course starting school at Longcroft in Year 7. This is one of the most important events in our school calendar, introducing new pupils and families to their tutors for the next academic year and ensuring that pupils feel supported and cared for through what is inevitably a significant transition in each young person's school life. Miss Woodhead, one of our new Year 7 tutors, commented "I'm really looking forward to spending time with my new tutor group on the full induction day and helping them to progress throughout their Longcroft journey."

She didn't need to wait long, as the following week we were delighted to welcome Year 6 pupils to our annual Induction Day. Coming together from well over twenty different primary schools, our September starters enjoyed a range of different activities, working together in their new house teams as a formal introduction to our Longcroft Community.

The structure of the day contained different lessons from across the curriculum, with children learning new routines, experiencing the canteen and having extended sports sessions to promote team building and have some fun.

All of our tutor groups were able to spend time with their new form tutor in the morning and also got to know each other as a group. Tutor time at Longcroft School is thirty minutes every day; we recognise that tutors are central in both caring for pupils and, crucially, monitoring their progress both academically and socially. Tutors encourage success, aspiration, participation and the highest possible standards of work and behaviour. Every morning, a form tutor checks in with their tutor group and sets up a strong, positive foundation for a successful day.

Included in the curriculum activities was the subject of Science. Our children participated in a Chemistry exercise focusing on good experimental practices and safety. Part of the session included mixing different chemicals and



observing the reactions that took place. Thomas said, "the teachers in Science were friendly, we wore goggles for the first time". Emma stated that she had "enjoyed Science the most and had a lot of fun". Other activities throughout the day included a Murder Mystery theme in the English department, completing a Scavenger Hunt in Geography and looking at artefacts and primary sources in History. Jamie said "I got a lot out of the Geography session, I like to look at flags and learn about different countries".

Oscar said, "my favourite part of the day was making new friends already from different schools". Reflecting on the day, George said "I liked how the day went and doing new and different lessons. I want to see my timetable in September already to see what other lessons I'll be doing"

The pupils received a free lunch on the day, Arnie said the food was the best bit of the day (and he had enjoyed all the activities too!). After lunch, the children enjoyed Physical Education activities, participating in dodgeball and capture-the-flag. Soon after joining our Longcroft community in September, Year 7 pupils enjoyed receiving free books chosen as part of the BookBuzz scheme. Bookbuzz is a reading programme from BookTrust that aims to help schools inspire a love of reading in 11 to 13-year-olds. Participating schools give children the opportunity to choose their own book to take home and keep from a list of 16 titles. They are all carefully selected by a panel of experts to ensure quality, suitability and to encourage reading for pleasure.

We are delighted that our pupils are able to benefit from this wonderful programme each year, with the amazing support of our Friends of Longcroft School (FOLS). Year 7 pupil Ava said, "The book I chose was 'The Rise of the School for Good and Evil' because the front cover reminds me of Harry Potter and I love Harry Potter." Oscar explained, "I chose the BookBuzz book 'Dread Wood' because I have read and enjoyed similar books and it sounded exciting." Millie also chose 'Dread Wood' – she explained, "I chose it because I love horrors." 'Dread Wood' was certainly a popular choice from the 16 books available – Gabrielle added, "It was the one that stood out to me the most and it looked most interesting." Sam said, "I chose this book because I like scary stories and it sounds interesting."

Pupils heard authors briefly describe their book as well as having the opportunity to read the blurb. This was an important factor in Olivia's choice – she explained, "The BookBuzz book I chose was 'Dread Wood' because I like scary things and when I read the blurb it made me want to read on." Mr Worthington also had the pleasure of interviewing Arnie Carr, a mini-bike racer, ahead of his participation in international competition.

He asked him what it is that he enjoys about racing and how he came into the sport. Arnie competed in his first 8 hour endurance race, out in Andalucía in Spain. He admitted it was very tiring but enjoyed the experience, managing to get up to seventh position in the first session. "I was competing against people from different countries, some people from England and others for Europe. It was a really thrilling experience. In the Saturday race, it was great to be tested against International opposition".

The day before, Arnie competed in three sprint races and managed to finish fourth from the back of the grid which is really impressive. Attendance Rewards

Our Year 7 pupils have started to collect their first reward certificates for 500 ClassChart Reward Points. At Longcroft we create a positive and motivated atmosphere, within which pupils can take pride in their achievements. We believe that through formal recognition of achievement, a positive attitude to learning or community mindedness, pupils should be rewarded. Our ClassCharts rewards are designed promote a positive ethos through a culture of praise; we celebrate acts of Great Heart, Great Thought and Great Vision.

Praise and encouragement are integral in developing self-confidence and self-esteem that leads to further personal development. It is very important for us to motivate and encourage pupils by recognising their effort and achievement. ClassCharts is also a live tracking online application to ensure parents are kept informed of their son or daughter's progress and achievements. This can help to prompt conversations about their day, what they learnt and what they achieved.

Everyone likes to have their hard work and effort recognised and rewarded; it helps to build resilience, determination and ambition, and it inspires others to work hard and achieve. We go beyond issuing daily ClassCharts rewards to ensure that outstanding achievements are recognised and rewarded. Pupils with the highest number of rewards in each year group are celebrated in our weekly Newsletter, and pupils with the highest number of each type of reward are also celebrated. Pupils receive certificates each week in recognition of this. All reward points can be used in our Friday Rewards Shop at our Finance Office. This helps our pupils to equate dedication, determination and hard work with reward, and also encourages our pupils to practise their understanding of saving and budgeting.

Mr Worthington enjoyed catching up with Amelia, Holly and Leo from Mrs Scott's form; Dexter, Rosie and Elspeth from Miss Woodhead's form as well as Mr Charlesworth's tutor group including Owen, Harry and Imogen.
