Democracy in Action!

On Wednesday, pupils and Sixth Form students participated in democratic elections for the UK Youth Parliament alongside a UK-wide referendum on the issues that matter most to young people.

The fundamental British Values, one of which is Democracy, underpin what it is to be a citizen in a modern and diverse Great Britain.

The ‘Make Your Mark’ ballot offered an opportunity to participate in the largest survey of young people in Europe. The month-long campaign sees volunteers and Members of Youth Parliament canvassing the views of young people.

The annual ballot, which has taken place since 2011, gives young people aged 11 – 18 the chance to select one issue they think affects them and their peers most. The ballot includes issues such as mental health and well-being, responding to the climate emergency and ending child poverty.

Secondly, pupils and Sixth Form students voted for a candidate to represent them as the East Riding (East) member of the UK Youth Parliament.

Members of Youth Parliament (MYPs) are elected every two years across the UK. There are currently hundreds of Members of Youth Parliament.

Once elected Members of Youth Parliament meet with MPs and local councillors, organise events, run campaigns, make speeches, hold debates, and ensure the views of young people are listened to by decision makers.

Mr Coupe, who organised the election, explained: "Longcroft pupils and students vote in the East Riding Constituency. Each candidate made a short video which pupils watched with their form tutor. Candidates also wrote a one-sentence manifesto. After watching all 9 videos, pupils had to decide who to vote for at the polling station."

Year 7 pupil Jake said: "I think it was good because it helped me understand how important it will be in the future."

The whole event was about giving young people a voice, and recognising the importance of using it to shape and influence decisions that are made by politicians for our society in the UK and beyond.

As we move ever closer to the exam season, a further highlight this week has been the amazing creations that our Year 11 pupils have produced in Food Technology as part of their final controlled assessments. There has been a raft of different dishes on display and some impressive technical application demonstrated. Mr Worthington writes:

At Longcroft we are fully committed to knowing your child as an individual and to developing them as an all-round person, ready for the wider-world, with an appreciation of the wonder of the world and what it has to offer.

Part of our commitment extends to having a dedicated Care and Achievement Team associated with all year groups across the school. Mrs Newsam is a prominent part of this team, working with Year 8 and Year 9; Miss Fox is our Care and Achievement Coordinator for Year 7. As part of Miss Fox's wider role, she works as Deputy Safeguarding Lead for the school.

At the heart of everything we do at Longcroft School, the children are cared for and understood. Our Care and Achievement Coordinators have specific pastoral training, related to working with children and providing the appropriate support a young person might need in a variety of situations. The team of Care and Achievement Coordinators are available to support children before school, during breaktimes and lunchtimes as well as providing care after school as well.

This week, we launched the Options Booklet to our Year 9 pupils. The children are excited, and there has been a real buzz around the process with pupils discussing their potential choices and looking ahead to the future. Alongside Mr Thomson, Head of Year 9, we formally introduced the process to pupils as part of Wednesday's assembly presentation. On Thursday, we were thrilled at the turn out for our Options Information Evening, presenting to families about the process and the opportunities available in Key Stage 4.

This year we are really pleased to be offering a comprehensive suite of courses as part of the Options process, as well as maintaining an enhanced range of choices. This now involves selecting subjects from 4 separate blocks alongside the core offer of English, Maths, Science and Core PE. As a result, pupils are provided with an ambitious curriculum that is broad and balanced, and will prepare them effectively for the range of future pathways available to them at the end of Key Stage 4. This process represents the first opportunity that the pupils have had to make choices about what to study. It is a good time for the children to start considering their preferred future career, and to begin considering what post-16 route they might take to get there.

Our options choices, alongside compulsory core subjects, ensure a broad and balanced curriculum that keeps as many careers as open as possible. Whilst this is generally true, it is also important to note that choosing certain subjects can help to steer a pupil towards future broad areas of employment.



ATA's Preparing to Present!

We are grateful to Jason McAleese, Team Modeshift Active Travel Ambassador Coordinator (North Yorkshire, East Riding and York), who has been working alongside a group of Lower School pupils – our Active Travel Ambassadors.

The pupils are preparing for a visit to Beverley's County Hall when they will give a presentation about their plans to raise the levels of active travel to and from school. Pupils will also watch presentations from other schools, before a panel of judges will decide which school should receive a grant of £250 to help fund their plans. Year 11 Mocks

Last week saw Year 11 pupils complete their final set of mocks in Maths, English and Science. Pupils met in the Theatre before each exam and were then given a five-minute instructional and motivational presentation by the subject's Curriculum Leader. This included a reminder of which questions in each section to answer in the English paper, how to use the acronym CIDER to answer practical questions in Science and details in Maths such as always putting units with the answer. This allowed the pupils time to compose themselves and enter the exams focused on the job at hand.



Food, Glorious Food!

This week has seen pupils in Food completing their practical examinations. Ms George explained, "This week pupils in Year 11 studying GCSE Food Preparation and Nutrition have been completing their NEA2 practical assessments. Each pupil has to make three dishes and accompaniments that meet a brief set by the exam board. This year's task is all about dietary fibre so pupils have been using wholemeal flour to make pastries, bread, cakes and pasta and incorporating fruits, vegetables, beans, pulses and wholegrains into their dishes. Some really high level technical skills have been demonstrated - especially by Libby, Ruby, Izzy, Rhys and James."

I look forward to seeing pupils completing assessments in other subjects such as Drama, Music and Product Design over the coming months.

At Longcroft we'll be marking the day with book displays, fun quizzes in form time, and author visits, including talks and workshops.




Can You Get Jellyfish in Space? by Dr Sheila Kanani. Illustrated by Liz Kay





Onyeka and the Secret Superhero by Tola Okogwu





A tender tale of friendship that deepens knowledge of disabilities and encourages empathy,

A touching love story from the best-selling author of ACE OF SPADES. Heart-warming.


First Story Young Writers Festival 2024 – Booking Open Soon!

This year award winning YA author Dean Atta will be headlining the festival. Dean is the author of **The Black Flamingo** and **Only on the Weekends**, and has been named as one of poetry's greatest modern voices.



The Black Flamingo was a top selling debut novel in 2020 and awarded the prestigious Stonewall Book Award and the Carnegie Shadowers' Choice Award 2020, and sold to the US in a five-way publisher auction.
