Our pupils demonstrated their recognition of the importance of health and well-being when 25% of voters in last week's Make Your Mark referendum chose this as the topic that meant most to them.

We have enjoyed collaborating with Clare Greaves of Mental Health Mates who has led walks on our beautiful fields to promote the undoubted benefits of fresh air and exercise, and Mr Coupe explained: "These visits have given a much needed opportunity for our Year 9 pupils, in this very important year as they choose their GCSE options, to take a little time out of the school day to enjoy the beautiful surroundings of the Racecourse."

Mr Coupe added: "The collaboration, which I am confident will go from strength to strength, also affords our pupils the opportunity to visit an important local employer and learn more about one of Beverley's cultural landmarks. It's been fantastic to work with the racecourse staff, who are rightly proud of their facilities and the excellent site they manage. It is also important to acknowledge the contribution of the Cornish Bakery in providing snacks for our pupils to give them the energy to walk the course!"

So far over 60 Year 9 pupils have taken part in two Racing to Success sessions, which have seen them walk to the Westwood course. After meeting Joe McCabe near the five-furlong marker they walk the course towards the winning post, stopping at various points to hear some facts and figures.



The tour then takes pupils to the parade ring and the stables, before they enjoy some well-earned refreshments in the Paddock Bar, provided by Beverley's Cornish Bakery.

Joe explained: "For some of the students, it was their first day at the races, so to be given the opportunity to walk the course and see areas paying customers would never be given the chance to see was a real treat."



Murphy said: "I got to run down the track and they timed me - it was 100 metres uphill and I did it in 16 seconds. I got to hold a 70 year-old trophy and stood on the winner's platform where the jockeys congratulate the winner."

He added: "We went to the stables and looked at the different shoes the horses wear, and the weights they use if the horse has been in really good form to make it a fair race. Then we went into a building - it was really smart. We got really nice food from the Cornish Bakery."

#### This week, pupils have received their Progress Update report, which offers an opportunity to reflect on their work so far this academic year.

Progress Updates are a summary of how much progress each pupil is making in each of their subjects. They are produced to help both our pupils and their parents/carers understand exactly how each of our pupils is getting on. This year, we are sharing information about each pupil's progress based on assessed work in relation to their starting points, but also in relation to 'core pre-requisites' in each subject. These are core concepts that most substantially provide the foundation for the next stage of our pupils' educational journey. By ensuring that they are secure in these areas, pupils have the best chance of successfully building their knowledge and effectively accessing their curriculum moving forward. We believe that this additional information will provide parents, pupils and teachers with a more rich, accurate and useful picture of how each child is progressing within their subjects.

We encourage children to have the highest aspirations and believe, indeed witness, the incredible potential they have to do amazing things. Referring to our academic target setting, this reflects our ambition for all children, but is based on national data and is specific to each individual. Target grades for GCSE are never designed to be a ceiling or cap on aspiration or performance. They are simply an indication of the outcomes that pupils with similar scores at Key Stage 2, who have gone to achieve relatively well, were able to achieve.

In addition to understanding how much progress they are making, Progress Updates also present our pupils with a summary of their 'Attitude to Learning (ATL)' in each subject. A pupil's ATL score summarises a wide range of attributes including effort and focus, demonstrated both in school and through their homework; the highest possible score is 'Excellent (A)'. This grade encompasses all those skills and approaches that make accelerated progress possible, such as neat presentation of work, self-motivation, independent learning, participation in lessons, response to teachers' feedback and organisation. These attributes and skills, when employed by pupils regularly and consistently, ultimately lead to better-than-expected levels of progress.

Throughout all subjects and lessons, teachers also expect and encourage high standards from all pupils, and this is reflected in the excellent Attitude to Learning scores our Lower School pupils have received in their Progress Update earlier in the year. Their attitude to learning is further evident in their focus and motivation in class, together with their inquisitiveness and eagerness to improve. Overall, pupils make exceptional progress when they are enjoying learning, which in turn feeds their enthusiasm and motivation in each subject.

I am looking forward to giving out reward certificates over the next few weeks in acknowledgement of the sterling effort that our pupils are making. As a school, we will closely monitor areas for development when it comes to pupils' learning and interventions shall be staged accordingly.

With only 9 weeks until the first of the 2024 exams, pupils are getting more organised and focusing on success. In a week we have our University Revision Conference where more advice will be given alongside time to develop the art of revising in the most productive ways. All pupils are different, so a vast range of options are available from online learning such as GCSEPod, after-school and lunchtime revision and techniques such as flash cards and mind maps. One of the most effective methods of revision comes into play the closer we get to exams, and this is the answering of exam paper questions. Pupils can work with staff to fully understand the expectations of achieving each mark. They can then practise these which creates a familiarity for the final exams.

Each week to support preparation for their exams, Year 11 pupils' parents are sent a Period 6 and Lunchtime timetable alongside the weekly Revision Calendar. This contains the expected revision to be done by pupils, set by staff. It also lays out what is being taught in class and links to revision work. This week's examples are on the next page.

#### **Functional Maths Exams**

During the last week, twenty-four Year 10 pupils sat Functional Maths exams. They have been working towards them all year and were praised for their focus and effort in the exams. A big well done to all, including Ellouise, Bria and Casey.


## IN FOCUS BIOLOGY

On Thursday evening the Year 7 and the Year 9/10 girls' football teams hosted Hornsea.

Mrs Henderson said, "Finally the weather was kind to us at a football match! The Year 9/10 team suffered a few injuries early in the game which meant they played with one less player and this shows the quality of the team as they held Hornsea at 1-0 for the half. They then suffered another injury blow and had to substitute the goalkeeper. The girls battled hard and had a number of attacking opportunities but did not manage to equalise, despite another strong performance from the team. Well done girls!"

Lots of goals saw a narrow win for Hornsea, with a final scoreline of 4-3. Well done to all who played."

## Jack's First Team Debut!

It has been a pleasure to feature the progress of rugby player Jack Charles whose years at Longcroft culminated in success when he captained the Year 11 team to victory in the Hull Schools' Cup in 2022.

Alongside representing his school, Jack played for Beverley Braves and signed for Hull FC – playing for their Scholarship team and securing a derby victory over rivals Hull KR with a last-minute drop-goal in March 2022.

An incredible 2023 saw Jack appear for Hull FC's reserve team and represent both Yorkshire and England at Academy level. He also met Her Royal Highness The Princess of Wales who visited Hull FC's new-look Centre of Excellence.

Jack began 2024 as a member of coach Tony Smith's first team squad, featuring in all three pre-season friendlies before being called up for his Super League debut against London Broncos.

The game could not have been closer or more memorable as Hull's last-minute try earned a 28 - 24 victory and Jack celebrated with his teammates in front of the South Stand.

Mrs Barry said, "Jack was always determined to succeed and it was a pleasure to get to know him as his Head of Year. He worked hard at everything he did, and his GCSE results reflected that. I'm very proud of him!"


