Fresh from starring in Hull theatre company Middle Child's highly acclaimed production of Maureen Lennon's 'Baby, He Loves You', we are delighted to feature wonderful former student Laura Meredith and her acting career.

Laura explained: "Middle Child are good at casting and showcasing local Hull talent – three of the five actors were from Hull. I initially auditioned for the role of Lucy, but got the lead role – Jodie."





Having performed to sell-out audiences at Hull's impressive Stage @ The Dock, Laura and Middle Child received impressive reviews. Christopher Holmes wrote: "The real stars here though are Laura Meredith's Jodie and Elle Ideson's Lucy – definitely ones to watch. Meredith demonstrates a sincere and truthful performance...There's authenticity here amongst all of the players who have been gifted with such a brilliant script to work with. The energy is edifying and we, the audience, are gripped, suspenseful and always suspecting. Forget the wedding of the year, this is the wedding of the century. Well done Middle Child this is work of distinction and it really doesn't get much better than this. Outstanding!"

Now back in London following her eight week stay in Hull, on Monday Laura filmed for a feature film and is looking forward to forthcoming auditions.

Last year Laura featured in Hull comedian Lucy Beaumont's sitcom 'Hullraisers'. Laura said: "Hullraisers is the favourite thing I've filmed – everyone was so friendly, super lovely and great to work with." She added: "Comedy's my favourite."

'Hullraisers' saw Laura work alongside Taj Atwal who has also starred in 'The Syndicate' and appeared in 'Line of Duty' and 'Death in Paradise'. Laura said: "She was really lovely and it was great to work with her – she's done stuff I'd love to do, so it was nice to pick her brains."

A highlight of Laura's career to date saw her play Samantha McDowell in Coronation Street. Laura explained: "It was quite daunting – a very unique experience, with multiple cameras shooting at once and a very fast pace. It was really cool to be on the set and in The Rovers – it's iconic. I used to watch Coronation Street with my family."

Laura said: "I loved playing Jodie in 'Baby, He Loves You'. It was a really important story – I found the response of the audience and speaking to them afterwards really fulfilling. Playing the lead was an exciting challenge."

When asked about her ideal role, Laura thought carefully: "It hasn't been written yet. Something fresh, northern – a piece of new writing. I want a perfect combination of gritty, meaningful and powerful but with comedy elements, and modern – current. The perfect balance."



A graduate of London's prestigious ArtsEd, Laura left Longcroft in 2016 having enjoyed many wonderful performing arts opportunities. When asked what advice she would give aspiring actors, Laura said: "There is so much going on in Hull – there's such an arts culture and my advice would be to make sure you're watching and being involved in it. There are so many inspiring people to meet and connect with. I was amazed when I came back how it's changed since Hull was the City of Culture."

Laura's favourite memory of her years at Longcroft is Rock Challenge. She explained: "Getting on the coach and going to Brid Spa or Grimsby and having the opportunity to perform and compete together – we always put so much into it."

Mr Baker said: "Laura always worked hard and importantly she proactively sought out opportunities to gain experience and develop her skills. I enjoy keeping up with her career and I'm looking forward to watching her on stage and screen as she takes on many more exciting and challenging roles."





# Headteacher's Welcome

This week I have been speaking to children in our assemblies about our Longcroft Standard and why it is important to have high expectations of ourselves, both as individuals and as a community.

We have discussed the importance of doing the little things each and every day that reflect the high standards we set in all aspects of our lives. Success as described by Robert Collier, 'is the sum of small efforts, repeated day in and day out'. Academic excellence sits at the heart of the education we seek to provide at Longcroft and I unapologetically make examination outcomes a high priority. Our children are wonderful ambassadors for the school, and have been of great assistance in aiding with school tours during the day, communicating and articulating well with regards to what makes Longcroft School so special. We actively encourage our children to demonstrate readiness for the future by developing the skills and qualities that will lead to success in life beyond school.

A number of our staff also enjoy visiting local primary schools. Last week Head of Chemistry Miss Sinclair and Mrs Jones spent time in Tickton Primary School as part of an on-ongoing commitment by our Science Department to working with local primary schools.

The event supported the school's annual Science Week, and some of the children's wonderful drawings of 'What a scientist looks like!' are featured here. Congratulations to all the children on their fantastic art work!

Year 2 completed work with hand lenses looking at objects such as threads, feathers, newspaper and sand. Year 3 used hand lenses and microscopes to compare these objects, exploring the additional details that could be seen with the microscope. Year 5 used hand lenses and microscopes to compare animal, plant and bacterial cells. The samples included muscle cells, nerve cells, bacterial cells and palisade cells.

Miss Sinclair explained: "This is the third year in a row I've had the pleasure of visiting. As always, we were really impressed with how polite, kind and knowledgeable the children were."

Also, this week we celebrated our first Year 2 Festival of Sport, inviting








On Tuesday 30th April Year 11 pupils had a presentation on the JCQ guidelines (exam protocols) which is the start to the formal examination season. We wish our young people well in their forthcoming exams and are very proud of the effort put in, shown by their Easter revision attendance. In the assembly we explained how the timetable changes to allow all pupils a chance to have time with their subject

teachers before the examination to look at lastminute key areas. This will be sent via ClassCharts each week so pupils can plan their revision time. We are also continuing our pre-exam 10-minute talks from the subject lead to focus our pupils on the exam paper just before they go into the exam hall.

This is a popular and topical A Level choice ably taught by Mr Coupe at Longcroft.

When I am visiting these lessons I am struck by the depth and breadth of knowledge held by these students - the room is often full of challenging discussions and interesting debates.

I asked Mr Coupe the following questions:


# How is the course assessed?

3x 2 hour exams











### Paper 1: UK Politics

This is a study of politics in the UK, including issues around democracy and participation, political parties, electoral systems, voting behaviour and the media. In addition, students will study the three main ideologies of conservatism, liberalism and socialism.

### Paper 2: UK Government

This is a study of the way in which government functions in the UK, including the constitution, parliament, the Prime Minister and the executive, and the relationships between the different branches of government. In addition, the ideology of nationalism is studied for section 2 of the exam.

### Paper 3: Comparative Politics

Here, students will study US politics, in order to compare politics in the US with politics in the UK. In particular, we will consider the US Constitution and federalism, Congress, the president, the Supreme Court and civil rights, and democracy and participation in the US.

# What skills/knowledge/understanding are needed?

Enthusiasm, interest and an ability to answer essay questions fluently and effectively.

# What enrichment takes place for Politics in the next year?

Debates and discussions in the classroom; student involvement in local politics and in vote counting.


# What's the best part of studying this course?





# Revise, Revise, Revise



# "Your success and happiness lie in you." — Helen Keller

### As the exam season nears, it's important for pupils and students to revise regularly and at spaced intervals in order to avoid any last-minute panic and stress.

We all know that revision is an essential aspect of self-study, but it needs to be effective. Revision guides can be a great asset but just reading and re-reading them might not achieve the best results. It's better to use a variety of revision techniques and look at past papers and exam practice workbooks too.

Data shows that the involvement of parents and carers can really improve exam results. You don't need to be an expert, but showing an interest, gentle encouragement, and discussion can all help boost confidence. Below are a few tips to help when using revision guides.

- Encourage your child to read through the contents page and highlight any topics they find tricky. Additional time can then be given to these.
- After your child has read a topic ask them to selftest and quiz. You may be able to join in with this.
- Encourage them to write about what they're reading and then reorganise it, summarise it, and then explain it to you.
- Ask them to complete activities in the guides without looking at their notes. This checks for knowledge gaps. They can repeat the exercise to build up detail.

- Try 'Just a Minute'. After they have read 3-4 pages ask them to explain a topic without hesitation, repetition or deviation.
- Encourage them to attend extra in-house revision sessions and speak to their teacher if they feel they don't understand something.

At Longcroft we stock a wide selection of revision guides and revision cards that are easy to use and consider different learning styles and skill levels. These are sold on ParentPay at cost price or are free of charge if your child has FSMs.

Alongside quality teaching, paying attention and taking notes in class, revision guides can be a real help in conquering exam nerves and building up confidence.
